Ida Elizabeth Reinhold was born to Elizabeth Haller Reinhold and Albert Ernst Reinhold on March 11, 1921 at Franklin Square, L.I., N.Y.

Her family included an older brother and sister, H. Edward Reinhold and Madeline Marie de Marini.

Ida married Charles Michael Weber of Franklin Square, N.Y. on June 24th, 1941. They had two sons and two daughters, Michael Packard Weber, Stephen Albert Weber, Gwendolyn Beth Weber and Beatrice Anne Fulton. Other family include six grandchildren, and four great-grandchildren.

Charles died on December 29th, 1989. Ida married Donald Joseph Kampa on January 13th, 1998 in Tucson, AZ. Don passed away January 31st, 1999.

Stepchildren by that marriage are Richard D. Kampa and Joan Will. Other family include seven grandchildren, and fifteen great-grandchildren. Although Don and Ida's marriage lasted only a year, the love, caring and kindness the Kampa family continued to show for Ida helped make her final years some of the most wonderful years of her life.

After graduating from Sewanaka High School, in Floral Park, N.Y., Ida completed training in dental hygiene at Columbia University and continued study at Columbia Teachers College. For a number of years she was a dental health educator in the public schools of N.Y..

Ida and Charles, an attorney, moved to Henniker, New Hampshire in 1946 to help found New England College, using the small town's public buildings to house classrooms. They later moved to Philadelphia where Charles taught at the Wharton School and Ida continued teaching in the public schools. She completed study at the University of Pennsylvania and received a Bachelor of Education degree in 1964. Ida was on the faculty of the Oral Hygiene Department of the University of Pennsylvania Dental School for a number of years and continued with graduate work at the University. She also taught at the Vanguard School in Haverford, PA before moving to Arizona in 1973.

Ida was a member of the American Dental Hygiene Association and other state associations. She enjoyed her volunteer work at several Tucson assisted living facilities through the years, and worked with the Widow to Widowed Services Association. In later years she was active with SAAVI, the Southern Arizona Association for the Visually Impaired. For a number of years she was a member of the Unitarian-Universalist Church of Tucson.

Her loves included her family, her art, her talking books and her writing group. For more than 20 years, Ida was fortunate to have enjoyed the company of her many wonderful friends at the Casitas de Castilian.
